And give yourself courage to try!





House Cames



For Science Week, our class, Class 9, watched a great biographical video about Stephen Hawking - tragically, he had passed away on that same day during Science Week. It was a bitter sweet experience to find out more about this brilliant mind, and the research this amazing man was able to accomplish. Stephen Hawking was a great English theoretical physicist, cosmologist, author,

and Director of Research at the center for Theoretical Cosmology within the University of Cambridge. He was born in 1942 and he died at the surprising age of 76 years old on March 14, 2018.

One of the most significant parts of his life that we learned from the video was when he was diagnosed with ALS – Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis when he was only 25 years old. It's a disease that usually only leaves its victim with a few years to live, but fortunately for Hawking he was managed to live 50 years!

Lastly, he was famous for his theory about the Big Bang, black holes and also for a discovery named Hawking Radiation.






Special Days

It used to be interesting. It used to make students think... whereas now it is bland and monotonous. It is no longer about expressing your talents: you just have to fill in a sentence

with the right 2-5 words and to place the right adverbs here and there for the most part. I strongly believe that if a student reached the third stage of the Olympiad (out of five for high school, and the last for years 7 and 8) and if he or she can write a pretty good 300 word text, then it is definite that they can make use of the grammar and vocabulary a foreign language can offer in the right way. There is no need to treat people as if they are robots, it is better to let them express their ideas in their own manner because, as I mentioned earlier, a language is versatile, lively and colourful; a language can take many forms and it can have many faces of which all are supremely beautiful.






What gives the book its suspense is that you





For 6.99\$ you can enter an imaginary and mysterious story, which, trust me, you'll love.








If you are thirsty for action and breathtaking scenes then you ought to read the book 'The Giver' by Louis Lowry.





This book's gripping plot is guaranteed to keep you reading. You'll be absorbed into the novel from the beginning to end. Don't waste time and start reading this masterpiece.








MIDDLE SCHOOL THE WORST YEARS OF MY LIFE






Once upon a time some children were having a singing competition and Laura, luliana and Damian wanted to sing together the song 'Having Fun'.

Hm. Delivery on Sunday. Curious.


I hurriedly thanked the elder, took the parcel and slammed the door shut. The bottom of the cardboard was hot.


In the evening, we came back home. Everyone was very tired but after dinner we started to play again on my Xbox, lego games and with my toy cars.





