

Houses Are Here!

Beginning on January 11, 2016, the very first House Points are to be awarded to students, and the race to win the coveted House Cup will have begun! Much work and energy has been put into creating the three Houses: Hoovendash, Wizennwing, and Rumblesnap. Both students and teachers worked together for several months in order to put together all the many pieces that were needed in order to have such a system. And the impact can already be felt, especially in the Primary School where excitement is sky high.

What is a "House"?

The House System is a common feature of schools in the English-speaking schools in Bucharest and around the world. Students are divided into teams called 'Houses'. To start the system this year, students were allocated to Houses based on alphabetical order.

Houses compete against each other by earning House Points. Also, at the end of the year, there are the House Games. House Games involve one full day of direct competition between Houses according to three different styles of tasks: athletic, artistic, and scholastic. At the end of the year, the House with the most House Points wins the coveted House Cup.

Why have a House System?

Since the founding of the House System in England when students actually ate, drank, and slept in individual houses during school terms, to the present day use in prestigious British boarding schools such as Harrow, Eton, and Winchester College, the House System has been used to "encourage and increase competition between students and to create a supportive environment."

Our main aims for introducing Houses at Scoala Mea are to improve and encourage social, physical, emotional, and academic development in every student.

Students are not only rewarded House Points for individual effort, but also, and more importantly, for group/team effort. No one student can "win" the House Cup. It is most definitely a team effort. And like any team, it is only as strong as its weakest member. Therefore, each House has two Captains, one for Secondary and one for Primary that

motivate and lead their Houses. Also, every class has a House Representative who is responsible for encouraging their immediate House Members.

How do Houses earn House Points?

Houses Points are points given in order to encourage, challenge, and support each student both individually and in groups. The number of points given depends mostly on the accomplishment and the teacher's decision as to the value of that accomplishment. For example, House Points might be 'offered' to a student who has been continuously late with homework. When the student is on time with his/her homework than the teacher will 'award' the points. Probably 1 or 2 points would be awarded. However, for another student, whose homework is always on time, this is not a very challenging accomplishment. In this case, the teacher might encourage the student to help others with their homework, or even help 'teach' a class by demonstrating how the homework should be done. Here, the teacher would probably award 4 or 5 House Points depending on the amount of work and difficulty.

On the other hand, more House Points are given to group activities: Drama Week performances, Charity Work, Romanian and English Cross-curricular Week activities, sport events, etc. In these cases, each student could earn 9 to 10, or even more, House Points.

And finally, the House Games. Soon to be one of the most exciting ways to earn points. At the end of Semester 2 this year, sometime in June, Scoala Mea will hold its first ever House Games Competition. Like in the Harry Potter movies, students from the three different Houses compete against each other in different types of competitions: academic, physical, and creative. At the end of the day, House Points are counted and the House Cup is awarded. The House Cup is awarded to the House with the most House Points earned throughout the entire year. And to make this first year even more special, the House Cup will be named after the student with the Most House Points regardless if they are in the winning House or not. Their name shall live on as an inspiration to future generations!

What are the three Houses?

Students have been involved with the creation of the Houses from the very start. They voted on the names, animals, colors, and characteristics of their own Houses. They submitted their own House Crest designs, based on the voting results, and the teachers voted on the most outstanding creations. The winning students will have their art and

signature forever present with the House Crests. A wonderful thing to revisit in the future! Students then voted for their own House Representatives from each class. These Representatives meet with the House Captains each month at a special meeting to plan strategies and motivate each other to earn more Points in order to win the House Cup.



V Co: Thank you for your time, good luck and keep winning!






MY CAMBRIDGE EXAMS



The main characters that have been taking part in the actions were Bruno, his father, his mum and his friend, the boy in stripped pyjamas, Schmuel. Other characters that


took part at the actions were the soldiers that were always around the house, Gretel, Bruno's sister and servants.







ANIMAL FARM – by George Orwell



Revolution.

After Old Major's death, the animals try to keep control of the farm, excluding the existence of humans, especially Mr. Jones's. The farm is named Animal Farm and the 7 commandments are written on the barn which illustrates animalism and the equality between all animals. The plot revolves around the Animal Revolution and the major changes it brought to the farm by means of speeches, propaganda and animalism. This fascinating story illustrates the harsh period and the effects which influence the life of some of the animals and the absolute power.



The plot is suspense-filled making the reader want to know who will control the whole farm or if animalism will remain constant during the Animal Revolution. These moving and captivating actions make reader's hope raise throughout the novel. It leads to the cemetery, their next step of finding the money. That's where they find Pia Dante, Jose Angelico's daughter. She helps them with finding her dead father's money. Can they find the six million pesos, or the police will find them, kill them and keep the money for themselves?

On the whole, I would recommend this great novel because I really enjoyed reading it. "You never know what you'll find" is the quote that perfectly describes the suspense and mystery of this book. It has become a best-seller translated into twenty-five languages.

Orwell's attitude towards Animal Revolution

ESSAY on George Orwell's 'Animal Farm', by Teodora Stancu, class 9



This essay will support Orwell's opinion about the Animal Revolution which reflects his strong attitude towards the effects it brought to the farm and the power of the truth in destroying the others animal's understandings by means of speeches, propaganda and animalism.

Orwell gives a major importance to the speeches of the animals. Actually, they convince the others and manipulate them by means of language. For example, Squealer gains the support of the animals in his speech by denouncing Snowball's part in the Rebellion. Another use is represented by Boxer, who agrees with

Napoleon's form of controlling others, adopting his strong mottos "I will work harder" and "Napoleon is always right", the author reflecting the power of language.

Propaganda is an important theme in the book as the changes the Revolution brought are based on it. For instance, Squealer convinces the other animals that Napoleon's strict regime is essential in order to be strong and safe, which perfectly reflects Orwell's quote: "The most effective way to destroy people is to deny and obliterate their own understanding of history." In the first part of the book, Old Major uses techniques of propaganda in his speech and he identifies humans as enemies, the same thing that Napoleon does when he becomes the leader of the farm.

Animalism is also an important theme in the book, as it is broken during the revolution. This is clearly illustrated by the fact that the commandment, "All animals are equal", changes into "Some animals are more equal than others". However, animalism is reflected only in the first 7 commandments and it excludes human beings in favour of animals, which are equal for a short period of time before Napoleon takes control of the entire farm.

In conclusion, Orwell has a strong attitude towards the Revolution which is reflected by some of the themes in the book such as the importance of speeches, propaganda and animalism, which reveal the strength of some animals in destroying others' understanding.



Feeling the spirit of Christmas magic.




Orwell's attitude towards the changes brought to the farm due to the revolution

ESSAY on George Orwell's 'Animal Farm', by Denisa Tanase, class 9

This essay will discuss Orwell's attitude towards the serious changes brought to the lives of the animals due to the propaganda manipulation and acceptance of questionable acts, that are meant to destroy people's understanding in order to succeed.

First of all, Orwell states that "The most effective way to destroy people is to deny their own understanding of their history". This can be seen in the propagandas used by the pigs in order to tell lies to the animals on the farm. Needless to say, this helped them to succeed in gaining power and gaining the trust of the animals. Squealer used propaganda more than any other animals and prospered from it as he became Napoleon's right hand. 

Furthermore, the final scene is a powerful one, while the other

In conclusion, is it clear from the above arguments that Orwell tries to warn the reader about the dangerous changes that can be brought because of propaganda manipulation and questionable acts, by using the novel "Animal Farm".





Paris is a delightful city, city of lights, art, history and romance.






The Car, by Matei Baciu, 5 B






A Christmas wish by Alice Bradin, 4 B
